




Fort de Chartres was designed and built according to a principle of Sébastien Le Prestre de Vauban, the great military engineering genius whose work had revolutionized fortification design in Europe and America. Fort de Chartres was built as a star-shaped fort, an irregular star shape, enclosing about 10 acres with a bastion at each corner. The bastions are strong points and protruded out in each a way

a main entrance to the fort is through an opening in the gate. From here a road leads to a village on the Mississippi River where the river from New Orleans carried merchandise & returning cargoes are loaded with the help of hired natives. On the north side of the fort is a narrow land gate from the King's Road, the de la Rue, which connects all of the villages on Cahokia to Kaskaskia. An even larger river of the river gate is planned here.

Drainage, with a small reservoir channel at the corner where it was built.

Finally there was the King's storehouse where supplies and merchandise brought up from New Orleans were stored. These were used to supply the garrison and trade with the Indians and native people for agricultural produce and furs which were also stored in the storehouse for shipment on American canoes.






